

## Guidelines on plagiarism

Plagiarism—the act of using words, ideas, or information from a source without citing it correctly—undermines credibility and disrespects the intellectual work of others. To maintain integrity and accountability in our publishing process, we ask contributors to keep the following in mind:

**Copying verbatim:** Do not copy text directly, including from your own previous work, unless it is clearly quoted and cited.

**Self-plagiarism:** This happens when parts of a contributor's earlier published work are reused without proper acknowledgement, and should be avoided. Self-plagiarism includes:

- Submitting an article that has already been published elsewhere.
- Reusing large sections from a previously published piece.
- Paraphrasing an old article and presenting it as new insight.

**Improper referencing or paraphrasing:** When drawing on external data, ideas, or quotes, please provide clear and accurate attribution. Even when you paraphrase or summarise information in your own words, it is important to cite the original source.

## IDR's policy on Al

We believe that good ideas and insights come from people across all walks of life. We value inclusivity, and our policy on the use of Al acknowledges that one does not need to be a professional writer to contribute to IDR. We therefore allow the use of Al for:

- 1. Translation
- 2. Improving language and structure
- 3. Generating ideas (such as through the analysis feature of <a href="IDR Answers">IDR Answers</a>)

This ensures that anyone can contribute to IDR regardless of their English language or writing proficiency. However, IDR values credibility and original storytelling, and the usage of Al during any part of an article's production should be communicated to our editors when you're submitting your pitch or draft.
